



For those of you who were unable to attend the PLYC Business Meeting, here are some of your 2024 Port Captain's report highlights.

First there was a quick review of the Port Captain's responsibilities as listed in the PLYC By-Laws (Essentially to manage the PLYC reciprocal relationships with other yacht clubs and the PLYC relationship with the Port Ludlow Marina.) Then a recap of how to use the Reciprocal Moorage section on the PLYC web site and directly on the YachtDestionations.org website (this is the most up to date info source). I included several updates to PLYC's reciprocal relationships that were announced after the PLYC Handbook went to print.

Next up was an update on PLYC's Opening Day Celebration, Saturday May 11th. The ceremony will begin at 10AM. Directly following the ceremony will be the christening of new PLYC boats on A-dock. If you are interested in having a boat christened by the Commodore, please let me or Fleet Captain Cathy Andreson know by April 10th.

Following the boat christening ceremony on A-dock the boat parade will begin forming up. If I recall correctly there will be an opportunity to register for the boat parade at the same time you are registering for the Opening Day lunch in the Wreck Room. Please watch for the official announcement of the registration opening.

PLYC's Watch Captain program begins Memorial Day and runs through Labor Day. Each Watch Captain volunteer is essentially a PLYC ambassador to visitors using the PLYC reciprocal moorage space at the east end of A-dock. Watch Captains deliver a "gift" bag with a letter from the Commodore and information about PLYC and the Port Ludlow community. If you are thinking of volunteering, please contact Marion McCullough or me.

Related sea story: In 1979, after two days of upwind sailing out of Hanalei Bay Hawaii bound for Seattle, I fought a galley fire caused by over priming of an alcohol stove by an inexperienced crew member. Fortunately, it only took two dry chemical fire extinguishers to completely douse the flames that had spread to the wood bulkhead.

If the fire had spread faster or the fire extinguishers did not function correctly our crew of six would have ended up in a life raft. Given the wind and current, a drifting life raft's next stop would likely have been Japan. (This was years before emergency locater beacons or modern satellite communications.)

Women's Group Column
